The UN's military Peacekeepers operate on a Triad of Principles:

- Consent of the parties to the conflict;
- Impartiality of the Peacekeepers;
- Use of force by the Peacekeepers only in self-defence and in defence of the mandate.

These principles, which remain at the core of UN Peacekeeping missions make it a legitimate and credible source of aid for the nations in times of turbulence.

Over the years, the UN has garnered mixed reactions from the global community for its Peacekeeping, several Peacekeeping deployments have got accolades and cheers from across the globe, while some have been criticized for its failure in containing the conflicts. However, India can take pride in the fact that the undeterred commitment and participation of Indian Armed Forces personnel have received praise from the global community. Indian Armed






Forces personnel through their dedication and determination towards international peace have set a benchmark for the rest of the world.

India's first UN Peacekeeping mission was deployed in Korea (1950-54), followed by Indo-China (1954-70), Middle-east (1956-67), Congo (1960-64), Cambodia (1992-93), West Asia (1980-88) and Somalia (1993-94) besides several others.
